#### Reminder of Annual Election

As a reminder, the Section's Annual Election will take place later this summer. This year, the office of Vice-Chair, one Director position, and the office of Treasurer will be filled by the election. The Nominating Committee will announce the candidates to the membership at the July 19, 2012 dinner meeting being held at Messina's, in Kenner. Additionally, the full details of the election, including the credentials of the candidates will be announced to the membership through an email message that will be sent to all members at the member's email address of record, as reflected in the Association's membership database. Now would be a good time for every member to review his or her email address in the database and make any corrections that may be required.

#### **A&WMA Annual Conference**

The 105th Air and Waste Management Association Annual Conference and Exhibition (ACE) was held June 19 through 22 in San Antonio. I was fortunate to attend as a representative of the Louisiana Section. I enjoyed lots of great guacamole, fajitas, margaritas, strolling the River Walk, mariachi music, and a private tour of the Alamo. Oh, and there were some great technical sessions too!



The Conference opened with two fabulous keynote speakers – Kevin Butt with Toyota Motor Engineering & Manufacturing North America, Inc. and Carl Rush with Waste Management. It was exciting to hear about the waste minimization work at Toyota and the waste to fuel efforts at Waste Management. They are both leading the way towards sustainability in different ways that fit their company's business models.

Of course there is no way to attend all the technical sessions but some highlights for me were:

- The latest flare studies that show that the highest combustion efficiency occurs at the incipient smoke point.
- EPA considers continuous monitoring of flow going to flares to be Basic Practice and is considering requiring continuous monitoring of the composition of that stream.
- Boiler MACT will be final soon.
- Have you read the proposed Uniform Standards? These will be very important in the future.
- 43 GHG permits have been issued as of June, 2012.
- EPA considers carbon capture and storage to be technologically feasible so it must be considered in the BACT analysis for GHG.
- Most of EPA's NSR enforcement actions are around the issue of routine maintenance, repair, and replacement (RMRR).

EPA is still wrestling with how to show compliance with the one-hour NAAQS for SO<sub>2</sub> and NOx. They recognize that modeling has issues but there aren't enough monitors. Funding for the monitors is also an issue in this era of tight state budgets.

In addition to these informative technical sessions and panels, there were opportunities to mentor young professionals, attend student environmental challenge presentations, and numerous networking opportunities. The ACE truly can prepare a professional for the challenges of dealing with the complex regulations and policies that continue to pour from EPA.

The next ACE will be held June 25 through 28, 2013 in Chicago. I counted only 9 Louisiana Section members in San Antonio – let's work to increase that in 2013!

## **ACE: A Student Member Experience**

When I first learned that I placed second in the Master's Level Platform Paper Competition for my paper titled "China: The Fastest Growing Economy and The Associated Air Quality Challenges", I was delighted. This achievement gave me the opportunity to travel to San Antonio to attend and present my paper at the A&WMA Annual Conference and Exhibition.

Along with three colleagues, I drove from New Orleans to San Antonio on Monday, June 18. The next day, all four of us registered for the conference and our designated monitor-

ing sessions. I presented my paper in the "Size Segregated PM and Data Analysis" session. The other papers in my session were very well researched, informative, and I learned a lot from their presentations. In my paper, I discussed the air quality of major cities in China such as Beijing, Shanghai, Changzhi, Shaoxing, Shenzhen, and Xiamen with respect to PM2.5, SO2, and NO2. The objective of this study was to assess the air quality of these cities, and to compare the pollutant concentrations with the National Ambient Air Quality Standard (NAAQS) used in the United States. My study also engages with the issues of health hazards associated with air pollution and the effective systems that can be developed to control air pollution in China.

On the last day of conference, I monitored a session on "Waste Conversion Technology Case Study: Terrabon" which was also very interesting and knowledgeable. My colleagues also had the opportunity to present their respective paper and monitor their assigned sessions. In addition, during the conference we also attended the networking session and exhibition hall. Being a young professional, the conference proved to be very beneficial for all of us in terms of networking and acquiring some industrial knowledge.

The most exciting part of the conference was the Students Award Ceremony. Not only was I awarded for my paper, but I came to know a number of well-known people in our field, such as Dr. C. David Cooper who is the author of the popular text book "Air Pollution Control". Overall my experience of A&WMA conference was great and exciting. It broadened my understanding in the field of environmental engineering, not only related to air pollution, but also the software applications, sustainable development, and others. I look forward to taking part in future A&WMA conferences.

Graham spoke of many legis-



#### **Heat Stress Prevention**

We all know these southern summer months can be hard on everyone, specifically when it comes to the heat. Air temperature, humidity, and clothing can drastically affect the risk of heat-related illnesses. Three major forms of heat illnesses include heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke. The question is how to keep from developing these types of sicknesses. When you learn the symptoms that precede heat stress, it can be very helpful in noticing issues before they strike. Everything from headaches and dizziness to irritability and upset stomachs can be examples of heat exhaustion. If not treated promptly early on, heat exhaustion can lead to heat stroke. Heat stroke is the most dangerous of all heat stress illnesses and can be potentially fatal. Heat stroke symptoms can consist of dry hot skin without sweating, mental confusion, and even seizures. The prevention of heat stress is very important to your health while on site in the work place. When working in extreme conditions it is important to establish a work/rest schedule, block out direct sun, drink lots of water, wear lightweight/light-colored/loose fitting clothing, and avoid caffeinated drinks or heavy meals. If any of these symptoms start happening to you, the best thing to do is to move to a cool, shaded area, sip on cool water, and possibly seek medical attention. Let's not let the summer get the best of us, stay healthy!

#### Louisiana A&WMA 2012 Fall Conference - Call for Presentation Abstracts

The Louisiana Section of the Air & Waste Management Association is now accepting abstracts for presentations at its 2012 Fall Conference to be held October 30 and 31 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Baton Rouge. Presentations selected from this Call for Abstracts will supplement the presentations made by invited speakers.

#### The deadline for abstracts is July 13, 2012.

The conference planning committee developed the list of topics (below) that was felt to be of interest to the regulated community, but we invite you to submit an abstract on any topic of your choosing. Please keep in mind that the audience is generally composed of attorneys, regulators, environmental managers, and consultants. We also plan to have sessions specifically geared for Young Professionals.

Abstracts need be no more than one page - two pages at the most. A title should be at the top of the page along with the author and all co-authors. The presentations should be geared to last no longer than 30 minutes, including time for questions and answers. Long form papers are not strictly required, but some form of written materials (PowerPoint presentations are certainly acceptable) must be submitted in advance and approved by the Conference Committee.

This year's suggested topics, in no particular order, include:

- Air regulations update
- State nonattainment developments
  - New ozone rules
  - Schedules for new NAAQS and LA. Attainment outlook
- State permitting program
- New Source Review Issues
- Greenhouse Gas Issues
- Interrelated air and wastewater topics
- Emissions Calculations and ERIC
- New or Updated EPCRA issues
- Boiler MACT
- Modeling against new NAAQS PM2.5, SO2 and NOx
- DEQ Initiatives
- Enforcement Initiatives
- New EPA Uniform Standards
- New EPA Chemical Source rules
- New Oil and Gas rules
- Future of flare regulations
- Solid Waste or Hazardous Waste topics, including common violations and permitting
- More re engines, NSPS, NESHAPs and permitting
- Strategic Planning for Air Quality Compliance
- For Young Professionals: What's coming from DEQ and EPA, new guidelines, professional tips, briefing on HON/MON, modeling techniques

The above topics are just suggestions. You are welcome to submit an abstract on any topic appropriate to the intended audience.

We cannot accept abstracts that are submitted late. Our review schedule is too tight to accommodate late submissions so, please get your abstract in on or before July 13th. Please note that,

in accordance with A&WMA guidelines, speakers selected on the basis of an abstract submittal will **not** receive a complimentary conference registration. Selected speakers will be allowed to attend the session in which their presentation is made without paying a registration fee. Speakers would be required to pay the daily or full conference fee for attendance in sessions other than the session that includes his/her presentation.

The Conference Committee is currently planning space for 10-12 papers to be selected for presentation from among the abstracts submitted. Abstracts will be graded by an independent review committee composed of two senior DEQ staff and three to four industry environmental professionals. No outside attorneys or consultants will be on the abstract review committee. Papers will be selected based on quality, interest level and timeliness of topic and appropriateness for the target conference audience.

Industry, consultants, and attorneys are all encouraged to submit abstracts. This message is being sent to the LA Section members who have e-mail addresses on file with Headquarters, so feel free to forward the Call for Abstracts to others who might be interested.

If your abstract is selected for presentation, you will be notified and will receive further information about the requirements for the presentation, including the use of the A&WMA style guide and the early-October final deadline for submission of complete and final presentations.
